Week 13: The problem solving essay

Problem Solving Essay

From the cause OR effect essay, we progress to our final major essay of the term: the problem solving essay. This essay is a natural extension of the previous essay, as you will see shortly.

Note that problem solving is fraught with danger for many reasons. The primary reason can be summed up in one word: ASSUMPTIONS

Here are the stages in problem solving. Once we are familiar with these, we can see the areas where assumptions slip in:

- 1. Identify a situation
- 2. Determine it's a problem (by identifying negative effects)
- 3. Determine causes
- 4. Propose solutions
- 5. Defend solutions

Look at where assumptions can slip in:

- 1. We ASSUME a situation is a problem when it might not be.
- 2. We ASSUME others agree with us that the situation is a problem
- 3. We ASSUME causes
- 4. We ASSUME solutions
- 5. We ASSUME others will accept our solutions without defending them

The chapter explains more about this, but just remember it's harder than you think to prove a situation is a problem, to prove the causes of that problem, and to prove that your proposed solutions will work.
