I am unable to view the readings from the textbook, so my comment here might be a bit off. From what I can glean, the discussion on the divorce rate in the US seems a bit biased. First, the rate of divorce has actually decreased in recent years, and also, sometimes divorce is beneficial to family members who have dealt with abuse or addictions of a spouse. The video clip Divorce Rates on the Rise, states clearly that women and children are "hurt" most when a divorce occurs, and this is true from a financial viewpoint, but there seems to be no discussion on the positive benefits from divorce.

I would also recommend delving more into aging. Families are for a lifetime, not just time when children are growing up.

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**Q7** What content needs to be developed to meet upcoming industry needs?

I was unable to access the readings for this class (the Bookshelf was empty) but from reading the objectives, self checks, and watching the videos I believe I have a good sense of what is being taught. I feel that this class focuses mostly on a "traditional" family and would benefit from delving into same sex parenting and the outcomes for children in these families. Also, the class objectives include how disability influences families, but I could not find anything about that in the course. Again, I could not access the readings, so it may have been there but I did not see it.

The class does seem to be a bit conservative in it's approach to families, maybe not pushing the student's learning as far as it could, but it is only one term and is packed with information.

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
