Greg Gianforte and family announced just before Christmas 2014 a \$500,000 scholarship program for trade students in Montana. This scholarship program will be available to all trade students at two year colleges in Montana, through the spring of 2016.

Gianforte has an extensive background of successful business startups in the technology arena, including Right Now Technologies in Bozeman, which was subsequently acquired by Oracle. As a result of these business ventures, the Gianforte Family Foundation graciously awarded seven Helena College students \$1,000 scholarships who are enrolled in welding, diesel and machining disciplines. These scholarships have made significant, positive effects in the lives of the students who received them.


