Propensity score matching is both a popular statistical matching technique in TAACCCT evaluation and problematic in that key assumptions are often violated in its implementation. The evaluation team at UW-Stout will be studying the effect of grant dollars (the treatment) on student outcomes, but simply observing better outcomes for those students affected by the grant does not guarantee the existence of a positive causal effect of grant monies on said outcomes, however, since treatment is not assigned randomly. During this talk we introduce our specific model of treatment assignment, and we discuss how the model can be used to appropriately facilitate propensity score matching, in order to produce valid estimates for causal effects.
