

CLIP CAREERPATH CURRICULUM: ENTREPRENEURSHIP

CUNY

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The City University of New York was awarded \$19.86 million through the United States Department of Labor's Trade Adjustment Assistance Community College and Career Training grant program to offer CUNY CareerPATH, a three-year program aimed at supporting adult students in career advancement and successful college transition, responding to local industry needs, and building CUNY's capacity to serve adult workers. CareerPATH provides academic and English language skills instruction "contextualized" to five industry sectors – health care, education, manufacturing, culinary arts and hospitality, and business – with the goal of engaging adult learners and accelerating their progress once they enroll in college. Strengthened connections between English language pre-college programs, occupational training, and degree programs — bolstered by strong advisement and enhanced student services — help students progress on each step of their education and career pathway. In the short term, participants earn industry-recognized credentials and find jobs. In the longer term, they translate their training into college credit and enter degree programs.

SUMMARY

The Curriculum is entirely consistent with the goals of CareerPATH. It fits the CLIP modality, and it is engaging for students at the same time. The course achieves at least three aims at once: to acquaint and inspire students to the possibilities of entrepreneurship; to improve their academic and business English proficiency; and to develop the academic skills they will need to succeed at the university. The penultimate section on career planning exemplifies this. Having read about successful entrepreneurs in on-line retail and the restaurant business during the course, students apply all they have learned in a meaningful way. Students do directed research into jobs they might like and what they need to study to get those jobs. Projects and trips add a hands-on, experiential aspect to the course. The books are interesting, accessible, and of appropriate levels of difficulty, with the second text more difficult than the first. There is a variety of additional reading material that is topical and current from newspapers, websites, and magazines to broaden the students' experience with different types of texts. In addition, there are practice materials written to prepare students for the specific reading and writing tasks of the CUNY assessment tests they must pass to advance to credit bearing college courses.

The curriculum is executed in weekly modules. It is designed for the CLIP schedule of 25 contact hours per week. Each module has essentially the same structure which is particularly useful for ESL students. Though they may be wrestling with vocabulary and concepts, once they know the structure, they know what they are supposed to be doing. There are theme related "Key Questions" that serve to frame the week's work, a reading from the texts with work sheets, supplemental reading materials, and a writing assignment. The worksheets are integral to the course. They are exceptional. They integrate content and language learning. They are varied but similar enough in format that students aren't confused by new concepts. They guide students through pre-reading, content, association, invention, vocabulary, grammar, composing, paraphrasing to give a non-exhaustive list. They are versatile and can be used as the basis for writing or speaking assignments.

In sum, this curriculum is both well-conceived and well-executed.
