# Bunker Hill Community College Allied Health Certificate Programs Internship Manual

#### **Mission Statement**

The mission of the BHCC Allied Health Certificate Program (AHCP) is to provide students with the education and training they need to become healthcare professionals (HCPs), while focusing on their needs to help them gain the skills required for success in the workplace, continued education, and the achievement of long-term goals.

#### Synopsis

The Nurse Aide Internship (AHE 106) occurs during the first semester of the program and is taken in conjunction with AHE 110 and AHE 111. It consists of a 24-hour clinical practicum conducted at a long-term skilled nursing facility and fulfills the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Nurse Aide Certification requirement. Internships begin after the eighth week of classes so that students will have time to acquire the clinical skills necessary for the successful completion of the internship. The evaluation of clinical skills will occur in both AHE 106 and AHE 111. Students are eligible to take the Nurse Aide Certification Exam after the successful completion of AHE 110, AHE 111 and AHE 106. Students must maintain at least a "C" average in order to take the CNA exam

#### **Internship Placement**

#### Eligibility

A successful CORI background check is necessary for any internship placement.

#### Academic Progression

1. By week four of the semester, students must have earned the grades of 80% or greater in each of their professional courses or the eligibility for an internship placement will be reviewed.

#### Professional Criteria

- 1. Attendance in all classes is required. No student will be placed in an internship if they have missed more than 150 minutes of class. This is the equivalent of one 150-minute double-block class, two 75-minute classes, or the accumulation of absence, tardiness and/or leaving class early. Furthermore, all missed material must be made up in collaboration with the instructor. This criterion is based upon Massachusetts Department of Public Health regulations.
- 2. Students must demonstrate knowledge and practice of safety procedures and relevant clinical skills. Assessment will be based upon demonstration in class, observation and sign-off by the instructor, performance in the Nurse Aide/Home Health Aide internship. Any student who is unable to demonstrate this knowledge and these skills will not be placed in an internship.

3. Professionalism and respect toward others are essential behaviors for any healthcare professional. Any student who exhibits unprofessional behavior or disrespect toward their instructors or classmates will not be placed in an internship.

#### Health Clearances

- 1. Health clearance involves the completion of a student medical record by your healthcare provider. It requires submitting documentation of immunizations and a current physical examination to the Health Services Office. The documentation would include information confirming that you are able to meet the physical and emotional tasks required of a student in a health profession program. All health clearances required by the College must be submitted by the first day of classes.
- 2. Medical documentation of immunity to Measles, Mumps/Rubella, Hepatitis B and Varicella is required in order to begin an internship. This requirement can be met by submitting a medical record of immunizations, which includes complete dates each immunization was given <u>or</u> documentation of the results of blood work indicating immunity to each of the diseases. Additionally, confirmation of a recent TDAP, annual seasonal flu shot and a current TB test (with follow-up, if indicated) will also be required for placement at clinical sites. Immunizations need to be given according to specific time intervals, so it is important to schedule timely appointments with your healthcare provider.
  - a. Evidence of the first Hepatitis B shot must be provided by the appropriate date (review checklist, cover page of this document).
  - b. Evidence of all other clearances (the second Hepatitis B shot, all other vaccines, the TDAP vaccination and the results for the TB test) must be provided according to the dates on the checklist (review cover page of this document). The requirements for medical clearance are subject to change depending on the requirements of a particular internship site. Failure to submit these documents by these dates will prevent the student from registering for Internship
  - c. Waivers of these requirements will be considered on an individual basis. It should be noted that clinical sites may exclude a student from participating in an internship if the immunization requirements are not satisfied.

#### Transition from College Student to Healthcare Professional

There are significant differences between the role of the college student and the role of a healthcare professional. The principle difference is in the development of a professional outlook, especially in the areas of being committed to working with patients and delivering high quality customer service. The emphasis is on meeting patients' and an organizations' needs in a real world setting. Therefore, the internship is an essential part of the training experience as it provides an opportunity for students to put into practice the skills and knowledge they have obtained in the classroom. It is a bridge between being a student and becoming a healthcare professional.

The internship also provides students with an opportunity to form relationships and connections with many other healthcare professionals. The demonstration of professionalism is very important and may be accomplished by:

- Having a positive attitude
- Being responsible, reliable, and punctual
- · Being appropriately groomed and dressed
- · Being flexible
- Demonstrating initiative, interest, and curiosity in the profession

#### Professionalism

Healthcare professionals must be attentive to their own nonverbal messages. Posture, position, gestures, eye contact, touch, and facial expressions all communicate a message to the patient as well as other healthcare providers.

The intern must also be attentive to more subtle aspects of their presentation and appearance. Supervisors frequently take notice of such positive behaviors as arriving early, organized and ready to work; taking initiative; displaying a helpful attitude; wanting to learn; using idle time wisely; asking questions; assuming responsibility; showing gratitude; meeting or exceeding expectations; and showing empathy toward others.

Supervisors are also attentive to interns who arrive late and/or leave early, are unprepared to work, waste time, overstep boundaries, engage in inappropriate behaviors (e.g. texting during a shift, checking personal e-mail or Facebook accounts, etc...), are aggressive and demanding, and who make excuses.

The healthcare intern is a representative of Bunker Hill Community College, the Allied Health Certificate Programs, and him/herself. As a result, care must be taken to project a professional image in terms of dress, hygiene, speech, demeanor, and attitude.

Cleanliness is a crucial value of the medical profession. Interns must demonstrate this value to others by having clean hair, nails, breath, clothing, and accessories. In addition, it is customary in a healthcare setting to avoid using products which have scents, such as perfume, hair spray, tobacco, garlic, and others because these can exacerbate symptoms in patients who are not feeling well. Displaying flamboyant hairstyles, make-up, tattoos, and piercings attracts attention to the intern and away from the patient, who should remain the obvious focus of the medical encounter.

Two of the characteristics most valued by employers and supervisors are dependable employee or intern attendance and punctuality. Every effort is made for the intern to have input into the development of their internship schedule. Once that schedule is formulated, it is mandatory for the intern to adhere to it. Absenteeism and lateness create confusion and frustration in the workplace. The intern must notify their supervisor personally, in advance, in the event of an unavoidable absence. As the internship progresses and the site come to rely on the availability and services of the intern, this practice becomes even more essential. Students must also contact the Clinical Placement Coordinator regarding absences or tardiness. No changes to a student's rotation schedule can be made without the express consent of the Clinical Placement Coordinator.

- Qualify for your 24 hour internship, there will be no exceptions
- Pass this course and qualify to take the Nurse Aide exam required for certification.

If you are in the Patient Care Assistant (PCA) Certificate Program you must pass the exam in order to be awarded your certificate.

Each student is expected to participate in the set-up and clean-up of the Skills Lab. No one may leave the lab until the instructor dismisses the entire class. Each student must demonstrate cooperative behavior with the instructor and fellow students. Appropriate personal hygiene habits and wearing of clothing that is appropriate for a health care setting will be expected in the lab.

#### ATTENDANCE POLICY:

In accordance with Department of Public Health (DPH) requirements for nursing assistant certification (CNA), 100% attendance is mandatory in AHE 111; this means that students are required to attend all scheduled classes. Students are required to sign the attendance book at the beginning of each class to provide documentation of class attendance.

#### **HOW YOUR GRADE IS COMPUTED:**

- Tests and/or quizzes will be given approximately every 2 weeks on material covered during that
  period. The exams will be multiple choice (choosing the best out of 4 possible answers), true/false,
  matching and short answers.
- If you get less than 80% on any test/quiz you should make an appointment with the instructor to go over the exam and demonstrate that you understand the material.
- Use of electronic or paper dictionaries or any other electronic devices during exams is not allowed.
- The final exam will consist of 60 questions and be similar to other multiple choice exams given during the semester; however, it will cover all material in the course, including questions on the clinical skills.
