The Emergency Medical Technician program prepares a student for a career as an Emergency Medical Technician. Emergency Medical Technicians are important members of the healthcare team.

Upon completion of the program, graduates will be able to:

- List key developments in the history of EMS, the five types of services that provide emergency care, and discuss the role of the National Scope of Practice and the National EMS Education Standards as they relate to the levels of EMS education.
- Understand the body's topographic anatomy, including the anatomic position and the planes of the body, the major structures of the respiratory system.
- Explain how pharmacology relates to paramedic clinical practice and describe the regulatory measures affecting medications administered in the pre-hospital setting.
- Define the term trauma and explain its relationship to energy, kinetics, and biomechanics.

Did You Know... ?

- Employment of emergency medical technicians (EMTs) and paramedics is expected to grow by 33 percent from 2010 to 2020, much faster than the average for all occupations. Emergencies such as car crashes, natural disasters, and violence will continue to create demand for EMTs and paramedics. There will also continue to be demand for part-time, volunteer EMTs and paramedics in rural areas and smaller metropolitan areas.
- Growth in the middle-aged and elderly population will lead to an increase in the number of age-related health emergencies, such as heart attacks or strokes. This, in turn, will lead to an increase in the demand for EMTs and paramedic services. An increase in specialized medical facilities will require more EMTs and paramedics to transfer patients with specific conditions to these facilities for treatment.
